Working overseas is not new for CSIS,

Indeed, SIRC has also seen how Ministerial Direction and emerging issues such as kidnappings, illegal migration have placed demands on the Service to report on overseas activities.

Director Fadden noted in February 2013 that the Service is aware of "dozens" of Canadians to have travelled or attempted to travel to engage in terrorist activities.⁷ CSIS is hoping that initiatives will help to close this information gap.
